1. Our Governing Body

The Governing body is made up of members representing parents, the community and the Local Education Authority (LEA). The Welsh Assembly Government provides guidelines for governors (available on http://www.governorswales.org.uk) who also undertake training provided by the LEA.

The Governing Body and the Headteacher share responsibility for the strategic management of the school and are responsible for the conduct of the school, the promotion of high standards of educational achievement, and the welfare and safeguarding of pupils. They operate within the framework set by national legislation and the policies of the Local Authority (LEA).

While the LEA is the employer of staff, the Governing Body and Headteacher have separate and particular responsibilities for their selection and management. The internal management of the school is the responsibility of the Headteacher.

The Governing Body meets regularly throughout the academic year and designates subcommittees to discuss specific issues. Sub committees advise and proposals inform decisions that are ratified by the full Governing Body

Individual Governors undertake specified roles and visit the school regularly to work alongside teachers in their delegated responsibility or subject area. This enables Governors to develop a clearer idea of how our school works, forge stronger links with teachers and provide insight and feedback to the Governing body.

Attendance

Attendance was 93.77 % which shows a significant decrease over the last year. This is due to families taking holidays after the pandemic plus the usual winter sickness and flu bugs. This will need to be a focus on next years SIP.

Additional Learning Needs (ALN)

The governing body & staff are committed to ensuring ALN Pupil's receives equal opportunities, support and attention so that they can achieve their full potential. The school ALN policy is reviewed annually and is a document which provides full information regarding procedures and is available on the school website.

The governing body spends an appropriate amount of its budget and has a number of supportive strategies for children on the ALN register. In conjunction with the Local Authority (LA) the school actively promotes and & facilitates the inclusion of pupils with Additional needs into mainstream classes.

Pupils receiving additional help and support are reviewed on a termly basis and, if a need for further support is identified, the school contacts outside agencies; Speech & Language Therapy, (SALT) educational psychologist, (EP) CAHMS, for further guidance.

Pupils on the ALN register are monitored & cared for by a team of staff, Ancillary Support Workers & class teachers directed by Mrs O'Neill the Additional Learning Needs Coordinator (ALNCO)

In the school year 2023-2024 the Additional Learning Needs Coordinator will be Mrs. Walker, supported by Miss Taylor and our Governor Mrs. Tanton.

Throughout the year staff have been taking part in training on the new Additional Needs Bill ready for The New Curriculum for Wales 2022.

Buildings and Resources

Governors work to ensure that the school premises and outdoor areas are maintained to the highest level, regularly evaluating and prioritising actions.

In 2022 – 2023 the focus has been on the continued development of environmental learning and sustainable development. The grounds have been developed with Bodfari Environmental to include a sensory garden. Through the summer there will be a dipping platform installed so Environmental Science can take on a more practical element.

Small schools share common challenges and Ysgol y Foel Governors are being proactive and taking a lead in identifying and establishing collaboration across small schools in the local area. The focus for collaborative working will be in areas that improve sustainability of the school, the wellbeing of pupils and educational opportunities.

Everyone in the school community is encouraged to take responsibility for the maintenance of the schools appearance and cleanliness. This is supported by the work of Mrs H Jones our caretaker. The grounds maintenance is contracted out by the Local Education Authority to Bodfari Environmental

Facilities for the Disabled

The Schools' Admission Policy seeks to ensure that there will be no discrimination against any pupil on the grounds of disability provided that the school is able to meet their needs. The school has an accessibility plan and a disability scheme to promote equal opportunities.

Toilet Facilities

The school provides well maintained and readily accessible toilet facilities that are available throughout the school day.

School Services

The school offers two primary extensions to the core provision of care in the form of Breakfast Club and After School Club.

Our Breakfast Club service provides 30min free breakfast club from 8:15am to 8:45am. Additional child care is available from 7:45am to 8:15am at the cost of £1.50 per session.

After School Club is provided from 3.20 t o 5.20 at:

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Running critical services such as After School Club can be challenging in small schools with budgetary challenges, pupil numbers and the current economic climate. The members of the after-school club staff have sought opportunities for funding and the

support of the parents in attending fundraising events such as school parties has been warmly received. The governors commend the staff in generating fun events and opportunities for the whole school and their flexibleness and willingness. We also extend our thanks to the parents for continuing to support this vital service to your wider school community.

School Prospects

The school prospectus is reviewed annually and is published on the school website or available from the school office on request. The school prospectus has recently been changed to acknowledge staffing changes within the school.

Healthy Eating and Drinking

All children are encouraged to make healthy eating choices each day. All infant pupils have milk and healthy snacks each morning. Water is available for all pupils and water bottles were provide to encourage them to drink water throughout the day.

School dinners are provided by Newydd Catering Services and their menu can be found on twitter and shared online on the school website. They follow the Welsh Assembly Government Action Plan "Appetite for Life" which seeks to raise and maintain nutritional standards. A varied menu is provided including theme days and has been well received by the pupils. There is a current roll out of free school meals from Reception.

Sporting Activities and Enrichment Activities

Sporting activities have begun to recommence after the pandemic.

This year the children have taken part in The Small and Rural Schools Sports Tournaments.

This has focused on re- engaging the children using a variety of sports.

We have competed in Dodgeball, Netball and Basketball.

The children have attended 3 residential activities. Year 3 spend 1 night in Kingswood, Year 4 and 5 spend 2 nights in Plas Menai and Year 6 spend 2 nights in Cardiff.

Children in Year 2-6 attended Holywell Leisure Centre for 3 x 1 hour sessions of swimming.

Children in Year 3 and 4 had Cornett lessons provided by Theatre Clwyd.

The whole school took part in Ensemble Cymru project and performed to parents.

Careers Days took place to inspire children in the world of work.

Mark Waters worked with the children on a space project.

The reading dog visited.

LouNur provided sessions on mindfulness.

Symphonic Sounds also provided sessions on relaxation using music.

The whole school benefited from community involvement in the shop project.
